President's Letter

Dear Friends in League,

First of all. I want to wish us all a Hanny Birthday! LWV is 85 years old this February 14, and I have to say that's a pretty good start Regarding our future. I have good news and had news. Good news first: Ralph Martire (Feb. 9). President's Cocktail Party (Feb. 26), Rouse 60 discussion (March. 9). Candidate Forums and Home Rule discussion for Lake Bluff (also early March, dates t/b/d), ongoing voter registration efforts, an Affordable Housing program with AAUW (April 9), a visit from a delegation of Ukrainian women, (sometime this spring, we're not exactly sure when vet), a program on the Electoral College (with LWV Highland Park-April 18) and our Annual Meeting, Wednesday evening, May 18, at the home of Liese Kant, Whew!

With all this going on, we can be truly proud of ourselves and the service we render to our communities. Education and voter service is at the core of League's mission, and this has been a banner year for opportunities to serve. It is hard to believe that such a vital, useful organization could be plagued with a perennial threat of insolvency, but, hey, it is true once again (our annual realization) that the Sisyphean task of keeping League's head above water is demanding our attention. We don't like to think about money, we're not particularly good with money, but we need money to fund our

programs and activities, and dues aren't enough.

Based on the 2004-05 budget and treasurer's records, LWVLFLB has received \$5,275 in dues payments as of 1/14/05. After all per-member payments are made to LWVIL and LWVUS, (based on 104 active members at \$48.75 per member, our local league is left with \$6.25 per member to cover all administrative expenses (Gorton rent, postage and printing for the newsletter, and costs for programs not covered by the Education Fund) Our 2004-05 budgeted administrative expenses are \$9,406.06. The shortfall. excluding donations and net profits from events, is \$4,131.06, or \$6-39.72) per member.

In taking up the slack, members have been generous. In the past year, members have upped their membership contributions by joining as sponsors and patrons, and Eleanor Beidler's friends contributed approximately \$2,600 in her memory. But these gifts are unusual, and the membership levels selected by members are variable. A reliable source of adequate funding for our organization needs to be identified, and toward that end, a Finance Committee was formed to work on the problem of League finances. The committee has met only once so far, but has identified problems and made several recommendations which will be further discussed at our February 9 board meeting. Increasing dues in line with a formula that takes into account our contributions to State.

and National has been suggested: \$48.75 (State & National PMP) + \$19.00 (local PMP) would yield a dues figure of \$67.75 for regular members. It was also suggested that dues for patrons and sponsors should be increased as well, to 2 time dues = sponsor and 3 times dues = patron. Senior and student dues levels may remain the same.

Further, a new category of financial support for our local League may be established, called the "Friends" of LWVLFLB. This group would not be dues-paying members of our League, and their contributions would not be subject to PMP payments to State and National, but they could provide financial support for our activities.

Oher fundraising activities were suggested, including an allhousehold mailing to Lake Forest and Lake Bluff residents announcing upcoming events and asking for financial support, a Bridge invitational event at the end of May, and development of a corporate strategy to solicit funds. A community dinner in October along with an Annual Appeal in November is being investigated.

Not all of our problems are financial. Like all volunteer organizations nowadays, we are a little short handed. More members would be nice...a bigger labor pool from which to draw to staff these events and activities would be very useful. Please ask all of your friends! There is really no reason why everyone in Lake Forest and Lake Bluff couldn't be a member of League. As the only non-partisan group focusing on voter service and education, we fill a unique role in our communities. No one else does what we do. It is up to us to ensure that we can continue doing it.

Board meetings are always on the second Wednesday of each month, at Gorton, at 10.30 in the morning, and all members are always welcome to attend. If this doesn't work for you, please e-mail me with your ideas, comments and concerns. The League of Women Voters is 85 years old this year. Happy Birthous to us! That's a pretty long tradition of making a difference, being the voice for voter service and voter education...let's make the next 85 years just as meaningful.

How is Laague Funded? Punding for League comes only from member contributions, either to operations or to our education fund, or from dues. However, most of our dues pay Per-Member-Payments (PMP) to State and National – only about 57 of the \$55 we collect stays here to sustain our activities! Observer: Nicki Snoblin Board monitored: Lake Bluff Village Board Date of Meeting: January 24, 2005

The Village Board approved unanimously the resolution to place the home rule question on the ballot for the April 5 election. The board emphasized that home rule does not necessarily equate to higher taxes, and they passed an additional (nonbinding) resolution stating their intention to keep property taxes below the tax cap limit unless authorized by referendum to increase them. The village will hold public forums to educate residents about the implications of home rule before the election.

The board also approved a resolution granting approvals for a restaurant to be located in downtown Lake Bluff. Holly's

American Bistro will be a family restaurant offering breakfast, lunch, and dinner seven days a week, with outdoor dining in summer. The restaurant will have a liquor license. The board discussed concerns with parking and hours of operation.

On the recommendation of the Historic Preservation Commission. the board approved the first reading of an ordinance designating the property at 210 E. Center as a historic landmark; the second reading was waived with the consent of the property owner. This property's impending demolition sparked a great deal of interest and concern among residents last fall, leading to the Village Board's activation of its historic preservation ordinance. Some board members felt that the property was not an ideal test case for the ordinance, because it was not nominated by its owners and because it is already in very substantial disrepair, but they accented the recommendation of the commission. As residents become more familiar with the ordinance, the village anticipates that more property owners will apply for historic certification for their properties.

Village President Thomas Skinner addressed the public on the topic of possible development of the open land behind the Harrison Conference Center on Green Bay Road. He acknowledged that a developer will be presenting a plan to build 90 to 100 homes on the site. He emphasized, however, that there will be a lengthy process of review with both the Plan Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals, which will involve public hearings. The property is currently zoned for 1.5acre residential development, which will not accommodate the density of development being proposed. The

Plan Commission will see the plan for the first time at their meeting on Thursday, February 3.

The Lake Forest Ad Hoc Housing Team is considering forming an Affordable Housing Commission and drafting an inclusionary zoning ordinance for Lake Forest. They are in the process of studying what other localities have done. They have also engaged an architect to come up with a plan for a site owned by the city that is near to downtown.

City of Lake Forest Writes an Affordable Housing Plan

The LF City Council continues to hold monthly Housing Committee meetings. They will wind down, however, once a Lake Forest Housing Commission is formed. The tasks and membership of the Commission are being worked out, but his is one product of the council committee.

There will be a Request for Qualifications to find a developer that can develop a feasibility study of one piece of city land. There was discussion about what constitutes affordable housing in Lake Forest. It is felt by the committee that utilizing regional area median income requires a selling price that is too low for the area. Lake Forest demographics would make the price too high. It was felt that Lake Forest should use Lake County demographics which would be higher than the regional incomes, but would allow for pricing of housing at around \$200,000. Nothing was decided. Many other suburbs are having similar discussions.

Other tools to help in the development of affordable housing were discussed. Among them are:

- An Inclusionary Zoning Code which would require developers to include in their plans 15% affordable housing
- The establishment of a Housing Trust Fund to aid developers in building affordable housing. The source of funding could come from a tax on demolitions.

City staff have almost completed the Affordable Housing Plan for Lake Forest. I think this is a significant achievement! LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS LAKE FOREST/LAKE BLUFF OPEN WORLD DELEGATION 2005

Open World Program. Open World is a nonpartison initiative of the U.S. Congress that has brought emerging young Russian political and civic leaders to communities throughout America. The objective is to spend about one week observing their political counterports in action and living with American families to become familiar with their life-styles and community and cultural lives.

The program is designed to ensure that the delegates have the opportunity to:

- Exchange views with influential representatives of appropriate federal, state, and local government agencies; civic organizations; the business community; and other NGOs.
- Participate in community events, leading to an understanding of the role of community organizations' interactions with the government.
- Receive an overview of programs, services and educational efforts focusing on the community's health, safety and well-being.

Visit health care facilities, schools, homeless shelters, social service agencies, social welfare advocates.

Attend workshops to examine issues surrounding childcare, eldercare, disability rights, special

education and prevention of infectious diseases namely, TB, HIV/AIDS, heart disease and the effects of substance abuse. Discuss the role of philanthropy and volunteerism in the provision of health and social services.

It is an exciting event for the League of Women Voters of Lake Forest/Lake Bluff to be selected to host the five delegates. The delegates will be arriving on Friday, May 27, 2005 and will depart on Saturday, June 4, 2005, Happie Datt Chair - International Committee.

LWV US Launches "LOCAL VOICES PROJECT"

A Public Dialogue about Civil Liberties

The League of Women Voters Education Fund (LWVEF) today lounched "Local Voices: Citizen Conversations on Civil Liberties and Secure Communities " an eight-month initiative that will foster public dialogue about the balance between civil liberties and homeland security.

"In this post-September 11th world, it is critical for all communities to explore the relationship between these two important topics," said LWVEF Chair Kay J. Maxwell, "This effort builds on the League's role as a trusted convener of community discussions, as well as our traditional focus on the protection of our civil liberties. We are

thrilled to begin work on Local Voices*

The League and its partners will develop materials, train local facilitators, and encourage citizen participation in large League-led conversations about this topic. While all 900 local and state Leagues will have opportunities to work on this important topic, 10 select cities will be the focus of the 1 WVFF work on Local Voices. Pennesenting ethnic, economic, and geographically diverse locations the outcomes of the conversations in these locations will be outhered analyzed, and compared with larger national trends A final report will be released in Fall 2005 to coincide with the national debate about the sunset provisions of the USA PATRICT Act

Local Voices continues the League's traditional leadership in the area of civil liberties. In the 1950s, the League led a national campaign. The Freedom Agenda, to educate the public about their rights and to combat the impact of the McCarthy hearings, More recently, the organization has lobbied Congress on legislation that affects civil liberties, and Leagues across the country have held educational forums about the Patriot Act. Local Voices will allow the Legaue to further involve the public in grappling with the interplay of civil liberties and security in their own communities. I WVUS

LWVIL to Consider State Study on Immigration

One of the major caucuses at Convention was on Immigration, chaired by the Glen Ellyn and Wheaton leagues and attended by Jane Partridge. The goal is a two-year state level study, which will need help from local Leagues both in womannower and in financial support.

The proposal was introduced on the floor on Saturday and passed, dependent upon more funding. A study costs between \$3-5,000, and the Glen Ellyn and Wheaton Leagues are able to fund one-third to one-half of that amount)

- How can we carry out our mission on a very limited budget without overburdening our members?


IDENTIFYING OUR GOALS

In June, the LIWU board held a retreat to address these questions and several more, some of which had also been discussed at the Annual Meeting in May. We face some challenges, but many exciting new ideas and plans are being hatched.

In regard to membership, the board has been discussing two main issues:

- Membership dues alone do not provide us with sufficient operating funds because most of that income is paid back out to support the League at other levels.
- Membership retention has been a problem for us, as for most Leagues, which makes attracting new members all the more important.

For the past few years, our standard membership dues have been \$55 (\$50 for seniors). Of this, only \$9.95 per member (\$4.95 for senior members) stays with us to operate our own organization (see chart). We have instituted various fundraisers and looked for sponsorships to supplement our revenue, with varying success.



MEETING THE CHALLENGE

This year, the Board has decided to institute stepped increases in the basic membership rate to bring our share in line with that of the State League. The first increase will take effect on September 30 of this year, when the rate will go to \$50°, members who renew before that date will pay the old rate. The senior dues (age £2 and over) will not go up.

In addition, the membership renewal form this year will reflect an increased emphasis on giving more than the basic dues amount. We have always had some members who make very generous donations, and we know League membership hotids a high value for many of our members. We ask that those who are able to pay more than the minimum consider doing so.

A new page of the Membership Directory will be dedicated to acknowledging our donors in the following categories:

- Patrons (\$250)
- Benefactors (\$200)
- Advocates (\$150)
- Sponsors (\$100)
- Supporters (\$75)

Another new emphasis this year will be on bringing younger members into the League. We have long othered a student rate of \$25 for any full-lime college or graduate student 18 years of age or other. A POSITIVE OUTLOOK FOR OUR FUTURE

All in all, the board is approaching the new League year with energy and optimism. We have an abundance of good idoas and a number of dyname volunteers. You will receive a membership renewal form in August. We hope you'll renew promptly and maximize the benefits of your membership by attending events and getting involved.

Making a difference by influencing public policy makes League membership exciting and personally rewarding. Action by League is unique because it is based on the informed decision of its members. It is guided by positions formulated through member argement after extensive study. Our careful and thoughful method of study and process of member consensus gives League its credibility and integrity when acting on issues. We aren't just speaking based on a hunch or a feeling ... we've done our homework!

The road to action begins with study. It is not always necessary to adopt a new study in order to take action an issue. If an applicable position exists, a local League may move directly into action. Along with acting on their own positions, Local Leagues may interpret positions formed at the national, state and county/ILO levels. If no existing position exists, a study may be proposed to form a position.

At the Illinois state League level, studies are adopted at the blennial convention and most often take place over two years. However, potential action possibilities, the scope and complexity of the topic will determine the time needed to complete the study.

STUDY COMMITTEE

A study committee is formed with indepth, impartial analysis as the goal, ideally, the committee will be comprised of members with different points of view.

Special non-member constituencies are often targeted for participation in the study committee. For example, the Sierra Club might be contacted during the course of an environmental study.

The study committee researches and then presents pertinent information that will enable League members to decide where they stand on an issue. The goal is to become informed citizens, not definitive experts. All sides of the issue should be examined so that the information will be balanced as well as objective.

SOURCES OF INFORMATION Two general sources of information

I wa general sources of information are existing publications and field research. Study materials developed by other Leagues can be a good source of information. (If the same or a similar study has been done, a League might decide to seek concurence instead of consensus.) Existing publications can include, laws, ordinances, codes; agency/association publications, booklets, pemphlets and brochures; newspapers, periodicals, and books.

Field research can be interviews with individuals such as elected officials, agency representatives, etc. Guest speakers and "go-see" tours can be informative for both the study committee and general membership.

Surveys, questionnaires and polls can also yield good information. However, some expertise is necessary in their design and implementation. Information from a blased survey could compromise the credibility of a study.

CONSENSUS PROCESS

As the study progresses, the committee which need to be addressed by the membership. Consensus questions are then formulated and may help direct the remaining research. The questions will also help shape the League's position on the issue and set the stage for League action. The questions should be openended to stimulate wider-arraiging discussion. They should elioit agreement on broad general concepts rather than specifics so the League will be able to select alternatives when actual options for action present themselves.

In the context of a study, the word 'consensus" refers to a specific technique. involving group discussion, by which member agreement is reached. The accord reached by consensus is not a simple majority, nor unanimity, but rather the overall sense of the group. The advantage of consensus over other methods of determining agreement is that it is a dynamic process. During the group discussion and exchange of ideas, areas of agreement will evolve and opinions will crystallize. A consensus is reached even if only a small percentage of members participate. However, maximum participation is optimal. Having helped formulate a position, individuals may be more willing to make a commitment of time and effort in its implementation when it is time to act.

POSITION STATEMENT

After members have had the opportunity to express their viewpoints, the study committee formulates a position statement. The position articulates the broad areas of agreement that emerged among the members, it expresses the League's view on the issue and forms the basis for League action. It is important that the position be broad enough to allow the League to initate, support or oppose a variety of proposals over a period of time. An overly detailed position can be too limiting and less useful in the future.

BOARD APPROVAL

The study committee then submits the position to the board for approval. The board determines if the position to fairly represents the sentiment of the membership. After the position is approved by the board, it becomes part of the League's program. Although positions are reviewed at each convention, the position statement is not sent to the general membership for approval. Therefore, member participation is very important during the consensus process.

of the goals. Of major concern to all of the women was the proposed amendment to the B.P. adding anti-abortion language. even though the Platform in no way advocates abortion. Of the I9I countries. only the U.S. and the Holy See supported this amendment. The collective power of the U.S. women in opposing this action so that it was withdrawn showed what women can do if we work together.

LAKE FOREST CITY COUNCIL APPROVES AN AFFORDABLE HOUSING PLAN

On March 17, 2005, the Lake Forest City Council Affordable Housing Ad Hoc Committee presented for approval its Affordable Housing Plan. The Ad Hoc Committee had been meeting since August, 2003 under the leadership of Mayor Jack Preschlack. The plan directs the city to form an Affordable Housing Commission and under their leadership the city will develop various tools that facilitate the development of affordable housing in Lake Forest.

The underlying policy is that 15% of new housing development must be affordable to people of moderate means. Priority will be given to seniors and to people who live and work in Lake Forest, With our escalating housing costs, this plan recognizes the importance of a diverse and attainable housing stock.

The League has long supported attainable housing for seniors and many seniors have advocated for this for years. Thanks to Mayor Preschlack for his leadership

Lake Bluff Village Board Discusses Controversial Harrison House Development

At its September 12th meeting, the Lake Bluff Village Board discussed and took audience comments on a revised proposal from the developer of the Harrison Conference Center property on Green Bay Road.

The meeting was held in the gymnasium at Lake Bluff East Elementary School because of the anticipated large audience turnout. Many Village residents, especially those of the West Terace neighborhood adjacent to the Harrison property, have been rallying against the development of the property.

A representative of the developer, Stonebridge Lake Bluff LLC, opted not to give a detailed presentation of the revised plan at the meeting at the request of one of the Village Board members, Rick Leaser, Mr. Lasser, an outspoken opponent of the development, called for an immediate vote on the plan without a presentation, but his motion was deteated in favor of more discussion and audience incut.

The 47-acre property, which is owned by Aramark Corp., is currently zoned for residential development on 15-acre lots. This means that, without any zoning change, the developer could demolish the manor house, remove 50% of the trees, and build approximately 28 homes.

An initial proposal by the developer included 114 housing units, but the Plan Commission recommended reduction of the density. The new plan calls for construction of 71 residential units, which would consist of a combination of free-standing houses and duplexas plus 14 condominium units contained within the current historic Harrison Manor House and coach house. The housing density would be less than that of the adjacent West Terrose neighborhood (2.3 units/acre compared to 2.8 units/acre).

The plan would maintain a 200-foot buffer of trees between the development and the properties to the north. The clustering of houses would preserve the manor house and coach house, which would be restored to their original state. The plan also creates a permanent conservancy, deeded to the Village.

the heavily wooded eastern acreage, which is significant because it was designed by the renowned landscape architect Jens Jensen.

The subdivision would be restricted to buyers 55 and older. A homeowners' association would maintain common property and provide snow plowing and garbage pickup, relieving the Village of these expenses.

Residents in favor of the new proposal cited its retention of most of the trees on the property and the preservation of the manor house. Opponents voiced concerns about the increased traffic on Green Bay Road and in the adjacent neighborhood, possible impact on Village infrastructure and services, and the effect on local property values.

Larry McCotter, speaking on behalf of the Lake Bluff Open Lands Association (LBOLA), praised the plan for its minimal impact on the wooded portion of the property. He said that, realistically, development of the property inevilable, since neither LBOLA nor the County is able to buy it.

Janet Nelson of the Vliet Center for Lake Bluff Area History also favored the plan because it would save the historic manor house, designed by Howard Van Doren Shaw in 1916, from destruction.

Questions were asked about impact fees, The actual amount of the impact fees would depend on the mix of housing units in the final plan. The subdivision would add few children to the schools because of the age limits for buyers. In regard to property taxes, if was estimated that Elementary School District 65 would realize an additional \$800,000 annually. High School District 115, \$250,000; the Lake Bluff Tabrary, \$27,000; and the Village.

The Village of Lake Bluff will accept comments from residents by mail (40 E. Center Ave.), e-mail (vib@lakebluff.org), or fax (847 224-7254). The Board will hold a special meeting on Tuesday, October 11th, at 7:00 p.m. (location to be announced) at which they expect to vote on the proposal.

We can watch council meetings on TV now

One concern I have about this proposal is that the very fact of League presence at all meetings makes a statement and is a civic activity of accountability that is important. Please look over and respond to these quick questions so that we can get a feel for the views of our members. Thanks so much.

Senator Link reaffirms LWV voter education work

All states offer voters the option of voting prior to the election. In some states, the ballots are returned by mail. This is referred to as absentee voting. Other states permit voters to vote in person at the offices of county clerks or at other satellite voting locations. This is referred to as early voting or in-person absentee voting. People who have trouble finding the time to vote on Election Day could find the voting process a little easier now.

This August, Gov. Rod Blagojevich signed an election law that contained several changes, including a new provision that allows for "early voting" - a process that shares some similarities with absentee voting but is much less restrictive. To vote early, a person would have to show proper identification. The ballots would be sent to the polls election night, where they would be processed much the same as absentee ballots.

Do you know the difference between "early voting" and "absentee voting"?

At the League's September Membership breakfast, Illinois State Senator Terry Link reaffirmed the work of the League of Women Voters to educate the community on this new voting capability. Senator Link worked closely with other Senate leaders to create a bill that would facilitate voting for all Illinois citizens while not increasing the work load of the county clerks' offices.

LWV LE/LB intends to hold an educational event in early 2006 in order to make surrounding communities aware of this new voting capability. In addition, the need for citizens to contact their legislators to advocate for positions they believe in will also be discussed. Now that Illinois voter registrars can register any Illinois resident, LWV-LF/LB intends to identify local, large corporations where it can host a voter registration drive. Corporations are a captive audience as we discovered last year at CDW. Employees are sent an e-mail reminder and then come to work with the necessary documentation. Employers give them the time to take a break from work to participate in this important task which now does not cut into Saturday morning errands, etc.

Lake County Clerk Willard Helander is pleased to announce that the ES&S AutoMARK Voting System will be available in all polling locations in Lake County for the March 2006 election. The AutoMARK is a ballot-marking system designed to provide privacy and accessibility to voters who are blind, vision-impaired. or have a disability or condition that would make it difficult or impossible to mark a ballot in the usual way. The system offers audio-ballots, enlarged ballot print, touch screen or keypad, sipand-puff interface, and gel pads for limited mobility. Helander notes "I am particularly pleased that each voter receives the same ballot. The accessible interface allows voters with disabilities to mark their ballot in private without being treated differently." 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Lake Michigan Interleague Organization Annual Meeting

The Lake Michigan Inter-League was formed 37 years ago to study, develop positions and take action on issues concerning Lake Michigan. Thirty-five members from the four states surrounding Lake Michigan met in Spring Lake, MI this year.

The event opened Friday afternoon with a tour of Annis Water Resource Institute in Muskegon, Michigan. This facility is part of Grand Valley State University. They have received many grants to do research on Lake Michigan and also to map the vegetation and ground water in the basin. Their contracts come from the state, private industry, and individuals

Michigan State Senator Patty Birkholz, chair of the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Committee; Cheryl Mendoza and Jamie Morton from the Alliance for the Great Lakes: and Chris Grubb, the Great Lakes Water Resource Coordinator for the National Wildlife Federation (NWF) were the Friday dinner speakers.

Senator Birkholz addressed the important issues of invasive aquatic species, water withdrawal, and controlling waste discharges. Michigan needs to take the lead, setting standards for the other states, because it is entirely in the water basin. Illinois is studying their invasive species bill as we craft our own.

Cheryl Mendoza undated the group on the Great Lakes Charter Annex, now called Great Lakes Water Basin Sustainable Water Resource Compact Agreement, which is an agreement between the eight Great Lakes States and two Provinces in Canada to regulate water withdrawals and ensure the region's authority. Conservation incentives, and an "improvement standard" that would require water users to include measures to benefit and restore the lakes' ecology, must be strengthened. Jamie Morton discussed the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement, which is a bi-national agreement up for renegotiation at this time.

Chris Grubb painted the Restoration Bill picture. In May 2004. President Bush announced his commitment to the Great Lakes Restoration and formed the Great Lakes Regional Collaboration. Since that time committees from the Great Lake States, federal agencies, local communities and tribes have been working on the draft plan, due in December. The governors of all eight states bordering the Lakes and the mayors of every large city have supported the restoration project. It has also been backed by 100 House members and touches 128 electoral votes. Chesapeake Bay and the Everglades have successfully received Federal money for restoration projects.

The Great Lakes contain 20% of the world's fresh water, in an area larger than the continent of Europe. We use it for agricul-

Affordable Housing on the Suburban Agenda

Kudos to our state representatives for supporting and standing behind the Affordable Housing Appeals Act, passed two years ago. There has been a lot of activity from the 31 Lake County municipalities that have less than 10% affordable housing. Both Lake Forest and Lake Bluff have approved plans that lay out the ways they will increase their stock of housing that would be attainable to those who work in our community, such as our teachers, police, and fire personnel. This is a very important tool for our seniors, who have long advocated for more affordable housing in our communities. In fact, League leaders such as Jane Partridge and Eleanor Knight have been advocating for years for affordable senior housing—the result of which are the senior cottages in Lake Forest.

The Lake Forest City Council unanimously passed an Inclusionary Zoning Ordinance which for multi-family developments of 5 units or more requires 15% affordable housing targeted to Lake Forest seniors. The sales price for an affordable home is between \$175,000 and 200 000. If a developer does not want to comply he or she can put \$130,000 per unit into a Housing Trust Fund to finance new or rehabbed affordable senior housing

It is important that we pay attention to developments such as what will occur on the Harrison Conference Center and the Barat College sites. Both Lake Forest and Lake Bluff will be giving preference to our seniors, which is in keeping with our League policies.

Our local league has contributed \$100 and our county league has contributed \$500, with \$500 more to be used for local study expenses


LWVIL is nearing its goal for the study budget but still needs our contributions.

Outreach to the community - Program

Educate members and community about topics of interest is the visible part of LWV that makes us relevant and attractive to new members, media and other organizational partners.

Consensus - Not going it alone

Act on the principle of consensus, by following democratic processes and parliamentary procedures at board meetings to create a whole board buy in for genuine participation.

Us, the grassroots - Membership

Be prepared to mentor and guide new leaders to continue to be an effective voice in the public arena.

Speaking with One Voice.

Promote and take action on national, state and local positions at the grassroots level in concert with each other. Share issues to enable consistent and effective action.

My focus and vision for the coming year is meeting with each one of you and to listen to the issues that concern you the most.

We need to make the league visible at the local government level. When you attend a village, city or any other governmental public meeting as an interested citizen and as the eyes and ears of the League, inform the board

with a brief email or note about the issue. If we have a position on the subject and can take action—then we can use the strength and power of the organization to influence outcome on a standing position.

Stephanie Victor presented a revised Non-Partisan Policy and a new Diversity Policy. The Non-Partisan document was updated for carity, and since it is generally a policy that addresses board member behavior, it had already been discussed and approved in that venue. A revision to amplify the language "should not support or oppose any candidate" was agreed to at the annual meeting. After a discussion referencing "removing barriers ... on the basis of age", the language of the policy, which is the same as LWVIL remained.

Marilyn Shinefflug presented the budget report. Local dues will not be increased commensurate with LWVILS increase in per-member-payments. The board will look for other ways to increase income. Though there was a concern that the motion facked a specific foous, the motion passed with more than the two-thirds majority required for a program item to be added by membership at the Annual Meeting.

Background: For 40 years, the Voting Rights Act has outlawed discriminatory practices in elections and eliminated barriers to voting and representation faced by minority voters. Key provisions of the Act will expire in 2007 unities renewed by Congress. These estimal provisions protect minority voters from discrimination, assist otilizens who are not native English speakers in casting informed ballots, and provide for federal election observers. Unfortunately, these provisions are still needed in colling places.

A biparlisan, bicameral bill has been introduced in Congress to reauthorize the expiring lemporary provisions. The bill is known as "The Fannie Lou Harmer, Rosa Parks, and Coretta Scott King Volting Righits Act Reauthorization and Amendments Act of 2006" (*H.8.) 9. The legislation was voted out of the House Judiciary Committee by a vote of 33-1. Unforfunately, opposition from select members of Congress has stalled action on the bill. The time to act on VRAs is now!

Celebrating the Reauthorization of the Voting Rights Act

Together we achieved the goal of reauthorizing the Voting Rights Act (VRA) before the congressional recess in August! This victory was the result of tremendous League activity, throughout the country and on the Hill, in support of the bicameral bill to renew the VRA. "The Fannie Lou Hamer, Rosa Parks and Coretta Scott King Voting Rights Act Reauthorization and Amendments Act of 2006," H.R. 9 and S. 2703. On July 13, the House overwhelmingly passed H.R. 9, 390-33. All amendments were defeated, thwarting efforts by some to weaken the VRA. The Senate quickly followed suit, passing S. 2703 unanimously, 98-0, on July 20. The League sent this letter to the Senate on July 19. President Bush signed the bill into law on July 27. This success was celebrated by the large and diverse coalition of groups who worked for more than a year to reauthorize the VRA. League members can be proud of the extraordinary contributions of our local, state, and national Leagues as we advocated together for the renewal of the landmark civil rights law.

We have GREAT news to report The U.S. Congress is poised to re-authorize the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act at double its previously authorized level. That's \$50 million over the next 5 years to utilize the manageable solutions we have to address some of the critical issues facing 5 years to utilize the manageable solutions we have to address some of the critical issues facing 6 Great Lakes in important first step in our efforts to reation the Great Lakes and pass the Great Lakes Collaboration implementation Act. It is a great, big feather in our cap, and a major victory for the Heading Our Waters - Great Lakes Collaboration.

When this bill was passed by the Senate and sent to the House, the House leadership offered to pass the bill at its previously authorized level of 58 million / year. Recourse of the reflected soften of so many of our coalition members: who tool Congress that business as-suad will rum the Great Lakes - and because of many of our Congressional champions who stool their ground, the House and Senate have resched a compromise that doubles the original authorization from SMI to \$50tU year.

I can't tell you how proud the entire staff of the campaign are of your efforts. Our coalition functioned like a well-oiled machine to make this happen, and it has been a joy to watch it unfold. As I said above, we couldn't have done it without some key Congressional champions who really went to bat for the Great Lakes, and who should be thanked.

The following members were particularly active: Reps. Kildee and Kufk (the spansors of the House bill), LaTourste (who lead a Republican latter to Chairman Perok), Hobson, Ehrisr and Emanuel (who did behind to seares work), and Welsh (who lead a Republican sign on letter to House lead-us). Obviously, Senators DeWine and Levin should be recognized—DeWine sepecially. His office worked hard.

If you see your Rep or Senator on that list, please do take the time to thank them. In order to build and nutrure the relationships we need to keep winning for the Great Lakes, it is important that members of Congress know their efforts on behalf of the Great Lakes are appreciated.

Again, congratulations everyonet We have a lot of work ahead of us, but I hope you all take a moment to reflect upon the victory.

The LWVIL study group has been researching the immigration situation in Illinois in many ways: looking at the history of immigration and laws pertaining to both legal and illegal immigrants; the effects upon education, health facilities, housing, workplace issues, the REAL ID Act, crime, driving concerns, etc. Since the State league adopted the study in June 2005, the group, under the leadership of Kim Reed of the Glen Ellyn League and Jan Kay of Wheaton, has been meeting monthly and with the help of many other League members has gathered information at the grass roots level. We are ready to draft consensus questions for all leagues to study and vote upon for recommendations for changes in public policy.

The funding came forth (\$5325) from many leagues, with our league contributing \$100 and LWV of Lake County \$500 and earmarking \$500 more for local study expenses. Completion is planned for March 2007 to be ready for the state convention next June.

NEWS FROM LMILO:

Lake Michigan Inter-League Organization 2006 Annual Meeting and Conference Report, Submitted by Robbyn Kilbane-McFadden

The 2006 Annual Meeting and Conference of the LMILO was held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on Oclober 6 and 7 at the Radisson Milwaukee North Shore and was organized and hosted by the delegates and members of LWV-LMILO from the State of Wisconsin.

Delegates representing Leagues from the 4 States of Indiana, Illinois, Mchigan and Wisconsin were present and adopted a Program and Plan of Action for 2007. Other attendees included individual League members interested in public policy issues concerning the Great Lakes, who traveled to Wisconsin to learn about pending legislation and action affecting their regions and local areas.

Participants were able to tour one of the Milwaukee Metropolian Wastewater Treatment Plants under the direction of Kewin L. Schledr who has been the Executive Director of the Milwaukee Metro Sewer District since 2002. Mr. Schaffer has implemented projects to reduce flooding risks for Milwaukee area residents as well as those to reduce the number of sewer overflows and to improve the efficiency of the District's hwo wastewater treatment plants. RE: LOCAL LEAGUE INPUT TO STATE PROGRAM PLANNING

October 2006

One of the most important responsibilities of local League members at state convention is to select the critical and timely issues that will impact public policy in Illinois. The program planning process offers several opportunities to influence the decisions ultimately made at convention. Recommendations for state program may come in the following forms:

- 1) Action focus: An action focus is a high-priority program item adopted by state convention delegates (for example, increasing school funding). After adoption, state and local Leagues act as partners over a two-year period in a concerted effort to promote the goals of the "action focus." LWVIL provides informational material and training to help local Leagues engage in effective action in their local communities, while also engaging in complementary activities at the state level. An action focus recommendation is appropriate if there is an existing state or national position on an issue.
- 2) <u>Concurrence</u>: Concurrence means "the act of agreeing with" a position developed by recommendations of a resource committee, decisions formulated by the League board, or positions reached by another league or leagues. Concurrence is an appropriate process when the program recommendation in question is straightforward and non-controversial. Leagues that are considering promoting the adoption or amendment of a state position by concurrence should note the adoption process outlined in the LVVIIL bylaws.
- New Study: A local League or Leagues study to educate members on a public policy issue
 as a prelude to action. A new study is necessary if there is no League position at any level
 (local state or national).

In the program planning process, there are also opportunities to restudy, in other words, modify, change or drop, existing program items. If a local League or Leagues wish to pursue the restudy process, they must plan on taking steps to inform other local Leagues and generate statewide support for a proposed change at state convention.

LOCAL LEAGUE PROMOTION OF A STATE PROGRAM ITEM

Some Leagues may aiready have an idea for a state program item that they would like to promote early in the state program planning process. When your League is considering an item to promote, the following auestions are essential to evaluating a proposed program item;

* Does your League have a strong and broad member interest in the issue?

* Is your League willing and able to work on the issue, including being part of a statewide committee?

* Is the issue of statewide concern or interest?

* Will timing and political realities permit effective League action?

* Is League involvement likely to make an impact?

* Is there an existing state or national position that can be used as the basis for action? (Again, if yes, an action focus is needed; if no, a new study is needed.)

A memoto your fellow Leagues outlining / promoting a program idea may be included in the November State Board Report (SBR) with the other program planning materials, provided camera-ready copy is received in the state office by November 10, 2006. Leagues may promote ideas at any stage of program planning by mail or phone and at convention at their own expense, rather than through the November SBR. It is to your advantage to promote an idea early in the process to generate enthusiasm and support.

November 10th: Deadline for local Leagues' camera-ready memos promoting a state program item for inclusion in the Program Planning Packet.

November 17th: Program Planning Packet sent to local Leagues, including: Status of LWVIL Issues and Advocacy, report-back form and local League memos.

<u>December - February</u>: Local Leagues develop their program planning recommendations and develop and distribute "lobby" materials for locally proposed program items.

March 21st; Local League Program recommendations due in the state office.

April 21st: The state board considers local League input and makes program recommendations, (budget and bylaws are considered at this board meeting, too).

May 3rd: State board program recommendations (budget and bylaws, too) sent to local Leagues.

June 22-24; LWVIL Convention - local Leagues may wish to host a caucus to promote a program item or lobby their fellow delegates to support their favorite item!

CAMPAIGN SIGN ORDINANCE IN LAKE FOREST

After considering comments from members of the community, the Lake Forest City ouncil voted on January 2, 2007 to create new rutes about campaign election and political signs on private property. Under the new rutes, residents are allowed to:

- place two political message signs on
 - place one political election sign per candidate on their private property during election periods, beginning 45 days before the start of early voting

The rules restrict the size of political signs to no more than 2 ft. by 3 ft. and no higher than 4 ft., prohibit illumination of signs, and require campaign signs to be removed promptly after Election Day. Signs that violate the ordinance can be removed by the City.

Action Tip

Be sure to place any political, campaign of candidate sign entirely on your own profits, not on the parkway (near the street) or ordinance does not limit the number of candidates you can support with campaign signs on your lawn — it just limits you to one sign for each candidate you support.

The multi-League-sponsored, fourday "Our Climate Platters" symposium in October featured many speakers, panels, and workshops. Recurrent themes included Kansas, CAFEs, carbon, and coal.

Immigration is a hot election issue this year, but the LWV/L adopted a position on immigration at last year's convention. Though far from national borders. Illinois is ranked sixth in the number of new legal immigrants annually, after California, New York, Florida, Texas, and New Iersey. The LWVIL study had its genesis in classic grassroots style, built on an earlier study by the Glen Ellyn League. Following that study, local Leagues around the state conducted their own inquiries and formed responses to State consensus issues. The final result was the adoption of an immigration position at the last LWVIL con-

The LWVIL position is already being used for advocacy to influence public policy through lobby-ing and education. But much of immigration law, especially the law affecting [2 million undocumented immigrant residents, is federal law. Therefore, a national position is needed to lobby for reform at the federal level. LWVUS is seeking consensus.

Consensus responses and comments from local Leagues across the country will be used to craft wording for a future rational position on immigration. Formulating the key points will require a balarcing of local incerests. After the responses from local Leagues across the nation are incorporrated, the LWOVS Study Commission. tee will present draft wording for a new national position at the LWVUS National Convention in Portland in June.

The process is not always easy, but as one member said during an immigration meeting. "They plan to stay, so we need to deal with

LWV-LFLB Immigration Consensus Report

Jane Partridge, Immigration Study Chair

The LW-LEB Immigration Study Group has discussed and made our response to the LWVUS questions on immigration. We met in two sessions, totaling more than five hours. These meetings, which were announced ahead of time and were open to all members, were held on November 1 and December 6, 2007. Our results are to be sent to National by February 1. 2008, and will be used to develop a National position to be presented in Oregon in June.

The following is a summary of our League's results. To see the complete survey with our answers, visit the LVV-LFLB website at www.hwv-lffb.org. The complete report is also available in princ for anyone without access to the web; contact Jane Partridge at (847) 234-1247.

Regarding federal immigration legislation, our League feels that high priority should be given to considerations of economic, business, and service employment needs in the U.S., family reunification and the rights of families to stay togather, history of criminal activity, humanitarian crises and political persections, rights of all workers to safe working conditions and a brable wags neighbor of all individuals in the US. to fair reatment under the law. Federal oversight and responsibility are needed for determining the status of immigrants (both documented) and carrying out necessary action frush as depostation of felons).

Issues that should be given less weight in determining federal legislation include ethnic and cultural diversity, immigrant characteristics, and education and training. Our local group acknowledges that there is no system in place at persent to deal with the health and age of immigrants, but that setting policy should have high

The LWV-LFLB study group would refrain from punitive treatment of unauthorized immigrants, such as blanket deportation and fines. The study group feels that high priority should be given to some immigrants being allowed to earn legal adjustment of their status (while others are deported) based on the length of residence in the U.S. and that all immigrants should be allowed to earn an adjustment to their status by doing things such as paying taxes, learning English, studying civics, etc. The study group gives a low priority to earning legal adjustment based on the needs of U.S. employers.

The group feels that federal immigration law should not include a national identification card with secure identifiers for off persons residing in the U.S. due to the limits on individual security, pertional privacy, and excense.

To enforce lederal immigration haw, the group feels high principy should be given to increased personnel at entiry points; more effective tracking of persons with non-immigrant visas; verification documents, such as green cards and work permus; improved technology to facilitate verification of employee visa status and sharing information among federal agencies: a program to allow immigrant cells: a program to allow immigrant

workers to go in and out of the U.S. to meet seasonal labor needs; and significant fines for employers who fail to take adequate steps to verify work authorization of employees. The group does not support the use of physical barriers and surveillance of borders.

The group reached consensus that

federal immigration law should address and balance the long-term financial benefit from immigrants with the financial costs borne by states and local governments with lacre immigrant populations. Consensus was also reached that fedaral immigration face should be coordinated with U.S. fornian policy to proactively help improve economics, education, and job opportunities, and living conditions of nations with large emigrating populations. Finally the group believes more transparency is needed in immigration policy so that immigrants are not living "in the shadows"

LWVIL Issues Briefing Report

LWVIL President Paula Lawson welcomed 150 Illinois League

Briefing on February 23. The morning's feature topic was "Con-Con" - the Constitutional Convention call that occurs every 20 years as required by the 1970 Illinois Constitution, Sadly, our scheduled "pro" speaker, Lt. Governor Pat Quinn, lost his father early that morning, in the absence of a speaker on behalf of Con-Con, attorney Nancy Kaszak gamely listed arguments for both sides. Even so, it was clear she prefers that constitution modifiestions be made by individual amendment, not a convention administered by our current General Assembly. Moderator Paul Green maximized his unexpected opportunity to speak extemporaneously, saying "For the first time I don't know what the endgame is for these legislators...they don't

make sense....Illinois' accountants

went to the college of Houdini!"

LWVIL issue specialists addressed five hot topics at the morning convocation:

- I. Claire McIntyre updated us on education legislation. Current initiatives center on truding income tax monies for property tax monies. Last year's tession brought no relief to public brought no relief to public schools' property tax dependency. SE 2288 is on the Senze floor for the first time, with 15 cosponsors.
- Jean Sanger reported that the Voter Service team is offering moderator training on May 10 and seeking volunteers to run local Illinois Student Vote mock elections in November.
- 3. The Show Us amendment report was given by Chris Slowik. The Show Us amendment would require any non-emergency bill to have a 21-day public review period before the Illinois General Assembly can take a final vote. The pos-

sibility of a Constitutional Convention has diluted interest for the moment, but the Show Us Amendment's call for accountability will likely be revived.

- 4. Paula Lawson reported on dimate change initiatives. The RES (Renewable Energy Sandard) bill requires Illinois utilides to supply at least 2% of power from renewable sources, increasing to 15% by 2025. The EEPS (Energy Efficient Portfolio Standards) bill imposes efficiency standards on Illinois utilities.
- 5. Gun violence specialist Barb Marsh reported on urgent effors. Amd intense lobbying after the Virginia Tech massacre, SB 940 passed, which improves the state's mental health reporting. Now efforts are targeted at SB 1007, which bians the ammunition magnituse typical of sent-automatic weapons, and HB 758, which requires background checks for private hangun transfers.

LWVIL Issues Briefing Report

Afternoon seasions featured breakous workshops on three action items: climate change, education funding, and immigration. An area of concern for immigration policy is that local municipalities' practices toward immigrants vary greatly. Chicago became a sanctuary clipt in 2006, and Evanse

ton is currently proposing an ordinance to do so. In contrast,
Waukegan has applied to U.S.
Immigrations and Customs Enforcement to get training so its
local police can initiate deportation proceedings. Waukegan's plan is to apply these powers to criminals only. Chicago's contrasting
policy is that immigration enforcement is the solo eresponsibility of the INS, not local police. Though LVVUS is now drading its study on immigration, LVVVIL has already adopted a position. LVVVIL believes the state should provide orientation and counseling services for immigrants regardless of their documentation status, and local Leagues are encouraged to participate in advocacy.

Action Still Needed for Education Funding

Claire Pichnyre, Education Specialist, and Syvia Tilman. Vice President, Issues and Advocucy for the LWVIL, are calling on members to contact their state senators to encourage them to vote yes for the passage of 582288, Fiscal Policy/School Funding. The bill was put on the called for second reading in early April.

Action Requested: Please call your state senator and urge her/ him to vote yes for passage of SB2288.

Brief Description: Senate Bill 2288 provides a new, permanent revenue source for schools, property tax reliaf for homeowners, and a billion dollars for debt service for a state infrastructure program, raises personal and corporate income taxes; provides a refundable Family Tax Credit for households up to an annual income of \$55,000, expands early childhood programs; increases the reinhursement for special education personner, and increases the foundation level over a four-year

policy/funding of public education and social services. SB2288 is proposed legislation for tax reform that will significantly improve education funding while lowering property taxes. This bill provides for consistent, equitable, sustainable funding for schools, providing increases for the foundation level and for some of the costs of providing special education programs. It increases the personal and corporate income taxes, which is anticipated to raise a total of \$7.3 billion and provide \$2.9 billion in property tax relief.

LMILO Report

As part of the annual Great Lakes Day in Washington DC on February 27-28, 2008. the Healing Our Waters (HOW)-Great Lakes Coalition gathered members and allies from the Great Lakes states to Washington to discuss with our elected officials the importance of restoring and protecting the Great Lakes.

This year, Robbyn Kilbane-McFadden. board member of LWV-LFLB, along with several other members from Lake County traveled to Washington on behalf of LWVUS and LMILO to meet with Illinois senators and representatives and to lobby for Great Lakes appropriations in support of the LWV positions on the environment,

Top priorities for 2009 appropriations requests included in the HOW-Great Lakes Coalition were focused on restoring the President's original fiscal commitment to the Great Lakes Regional Collaborative, which was a historic initiative kickstarted by the Bush Administration in recognition of the importance of the Great Lakes Region. Unfortunately, the President's proposed budget for 2009 shortchanged the Lakes in many areas.

Our members of Congress can help lay a foundation for long-term Great Lakes restoration and health by supporting key investments in the 2009 budget. Until the Great Lakes Regional Collaborative Strategy is enacted by Congess, it is important for the legislators to support increases in current Great Lakes programs in the 2009 federal budget.

Along with the other 225 members of the Coalition who were present in Washington, our representatives from LMILO

spent two days meeting with Congressional legislators from all eight Great Lakes states to discuss our concerns and ask for specific measures to be met and taken in this session and prior to the November election.

Our local League members should continue to communicate their priorities, as well as those of the LWVIL regarding our specific concerns about Lake Michigan, All of our elected officials here in Illinois pledged their support to conserving and restoring Lake Michigan, but shared their concerns about the harsh realties of budgetary constraints resulting from record spending at the federal level these past four to five years. They cautioned against unrealistic expectations before the November election, but pledged to work to the best of their ability to keep our concerns at the forefront of any discussions of money spent on environmental programs.

Report from the National Convention in Portland, Oregon



"The convention was fascinating, exhilarating, and sometimes frustrating and exhausting. From the 850 Leagues in the U.S., there were 684 voting delegates at the convention from 49 states and 14 II Os."



The Convention was held in June in scenic Portland, Oregon.

Three of our members Robbyn Kilbane-McFadden. Cindy Morehead, and Jane Partridge, attended the National Convention in Portland, Oregon in June. The convention was fascinating. exhilarating, and sometimes frustrating and exhausting. From the 850 Leagues in the U.S., there were 684 voting delegates at the convention from 49 states and 14 ILOs, President Mary Wilson kept everything on track in a business-like and very oleasant manner.

There were five days of plemay sessions, workchops, and caucuses. Three outstanding speakers were Barbara Roberts, the first woman governor of Oregon [pln kitziheher, governor of Oregon from 1993-2001; and former Colorado Supreme Court Justice Rebeact Leve Kourls: In addition, there was an interesting panel discussion on Global Climare Change.

The speakers focused on

public policy issues, John Kirchaber, a former physician as well as governor, presented a clear and convincing talk on universal health care. The Global Climate Change presentation was given by a professor from the Scripps Institute and a staff member of Oxfam. Justice Kourlis' powerful presentation was made possible because the resigned from the position to head a think tank for judicial reform at the University of Denver.

A practical and useful workshop was on membership recruitment. Two years ago the LWVUS adopted a membership recruitment initiative that began with a pilot program among five selected leagues. After much research, they decided to focus first on newly retired women aged 50-65 as the most likely to join the League, However, they emphasized that many men also join the League. In fact, there now is a man on the national Board of Directors. It was emphasized that membership is everyone's job, not just the job of the membership chair. We all need to talk about the League to friends and acquaintances

Probably the most valuable part of the experience was the chance to see in action many of the 25 staff members of the LWVUS office in Washington as well as many smart, vital, energetic women from all over the U.S. Our National League President, Mary Wilson, was especially impressive.

Among the important decisions made by the delegates was increasing our PMPs (per-member payments) from \$26.80 to \$28.00 for 2008-9 and from \$28.00 to \$29.20 in 2009-10. The in-

crease is needed because of rising operating costs due to inflation and decreasing revenues due to a gradual decline in membership.

In addition to electing new officers, the convention delegates adopted the program for the next two years, including a fast-track study of the National Popular Vote Compact (a consensus meeting on this topic will need to be held in [anuary or February), an education and advocacy campaign to fight global climate change, and an education and advocacy campaign on health care reform. The League's position, adopted in 1993, favors a national health insurance plan financed through general taxes in place of individual insurance premiums. The League supports administration of the U.S. health care system by either a combination of the private and public sectors or a combination of federal, state, and/or regional government agencies. On a more intimate note,

while at the convention, we heard with pleasure that one of our Russian exchange guests in 2005 went back to St. Petersburg and wrote her doctoral thesis on what she learned about adoption and foster care in the Chicago area.

It was a most worthwhile and productive convention.

Former LVW-LFLB President Embarks on Peace Corps Trip

LWV-LFLB member and past president Happie Taunque Datt will be in Macedonia for 27 months as a Peace Corps volunteer.

The first seven volunteers in Macedonia arrived in June 1995 to teach English in secondary schools. Over the next three years, programs were added in business, environmental education, and municipal development. With political unrest in neighboring Kossov, the

program was suspended in 1999 and again in 2001. The security situation has improved so much that Macedonia was approved for membership in NATO and the EU.

Happie will be staying with a Macedonian host family in Kumonovo (approximately 20 km from the Serbian border) for three months during training, which includes immersion in the Macedonian language and

culture. She will then be assigned to work in a smaller community advising and assisting in NGO/ business/community development.

Adlai Stevenson Think Tank Debuts

Several League members attended the new Adial Stevenson Center on Democracy's inaugural event, "A Grand Jollification," in August. Also in attendance were well-known political figures George McGovern, Jesse Jackson, Dick Lugar, John Anderson, and Ed Burke.

Bill Kurtis moderated the panel discussion, "The American National Nominating Process." When asked how to improve the process, Jesse jackson immediately responded that the campaign season is too long and too cestly and allows too much media influence. John Anderson added that the lowa and New Hampshire results exert undue control. Sen. Lugar undue control. Sen. Lugar undue control. Sen. Lugar suggested that the long primary period could be shortened. Spelling out his reform plan (at

www.fairvote.org), Anderson said a goal should be "to preserve door-to-door retail politics." Ed Burke concurred, adding that the nominating conventions have no constitutional basis,

One audience questioner asked how to lessen the influence of "big money." McGovern suggested that all campaigns be funded, lackson bluntly stated, "Stop selling ambassadorships ... where there is an amhassador to France, Germany, or Great Britain there is a campaign contributor." When asked about the efficacy of a single-day primary, McGovern preferred our current multiple primary dates, saving, "Candidates

are tested, and the smaller venues give opportunities for unknowns to compete." Jackson agreed, saying, "It's the third rail that makes the difference. We need change agents that are not locked into recycling same ideas, same candidates."

The Center intends to be nonpartisan and nonideological: its goal is to address challenges to democracy and governmental accountability. As its first focus, the think tank will examine the media. The Center will be located at Adlai Stevenson's former home near Libertyville, restored with a grant from the state and now a property of the Lake County Forest Preserve District. The program featured the film, "Health, Money and Fear," and two panelists: Ionathan Vander-Brug, Director of Campaign for Better Health, and Courtney Hedderman, Associate State Director of AARP Illinois, There was a good turnout and a very positive response to this excellent and informative evening, If you were unable to attend or wish someone else could see it too, the program is being broadcast through November on Lake Forest/Lake Bluff cable TV (channel 17: Sundays at 9:30

pm, Wednesdays at 8 pm, Fridays at 9 pm, Saturdays at 9 pm, Saturdays at 9 pm, Saturdays at 2 pm, Tuesdays at 5 pm, and Saturdays at 1 pm). It is being shown in other communities as well; see our website at www.LWV-LFLB.org for the complete schedule.

In addition, the video is posted on our website for those who prefer to view it there at their convenience.

"Health, Money and Fear" was produced by Dr. Paul Hochfeld, an emergency room doctor on the West Coast who recognized that much of the health care he observed was in dire straits. So, with the help of doctors across the country, he made this film available.

Health care reform not only is on the docket in Congress but also has been identified as a major concern of LWVUS at the last con-

After hearing that the City of Lake Forest is considering approval of 16 units of affordable housing on three acres of land across from the train station on the west side of town, near

Telegraph and Everett Roads, League members Jane Partridge and Kitty Cole recently visited the mayor of Lake Forest to talk about affordable housing. They learned that the topic will not come up until the end of the year. At that time, LWV-LFLB will communicate formally on the proposal with a letter in support of affordable housing.

Local Meetings of Interest-Shields Township

Shields Township held a Program Workshop on October 10th, Attendance included residents as well as representatives of service providers who partner with the township. Citing the Township Official's Handbook and the Township's 2004 Strategic Plan, Supervisor Gale Strenger Wayne made introductory remarks. The list of current programs and services was reviewed. but it quickly became apparent that the trustees were focused on costs.

There were two Shields programs on the agenda for action on the 10th: the Holiday Coat Drive and Holiday Meal Program. The staff and audience answered questions on these two subjects, and the board voted to continue these programs.

At the regularly scheduled Shields Township Board Meeting on October 15th, some of the concerns of the previous workshop meeting were revisited. Again there was a lengthy discussion of the limits of public transportation, particularly for special needs patrons. The discussion on the 10th had resulted in a decision to form a transportation comma transportation commandation and transportation commandation transportation tr

mittee, but after discussion on the 15th an internal committee was not favored. The food pantry policy was also changed: nonresidents will now be served once only and then will be directed to other locations.

The most animated discussion of the board meeting on the 15th centered on the township's grants to local service providers, and the imminent budget process. Supervisor Strenger Wayne suggested scheduling interview meetings for all the grant applicants, but the trustees dissented. A discussion of the township's philosophy ensued. Trustees Baehr and Carney stated it was not the township's supplicants.

to give money to "private charities." Supervisor Strenger mintained that many of the groups who receive township funds are more aptly described as "direct service agencies" who provide efficient outreach, and are a "best practices" model of township sovernance.

The board meeting on the 15th opened with the presentation of a gift of by Carl Kitzerow from Ribfest on the Lake Bluff Village Green. The monies were given by fest aficionados and earmarked for the Shields Township Food Pantry, The cash will be deposited with the Northern Illinois Food Bank, creating a tenfold purchasing power. Hence, the gift is actually worth \$6460 to the food pantry, and it was warmly received. It remains to be seen if other programs and services can weather the board's budgeting. The next meeting will be November 19th at 6:30 in the township's Community Room, For more information, visit the township's website at www. shieldstownship.com.

News from LWV Lake Michigan

The Lake Michigan League of Women Voters Annual Meeting was held in Saugatuck, Michigan, and included several fine speakers. Delegates were heartened to learn that two conference attendees came from outside the Lake Michigan basin, from the Erie water-

san, from the Ene water shed. There is hope that other lake consortiums will form and further increase the lobbying powers of their individual leagues. Discussion about the program of LMLWV centered on establishing priorities, with the delegates directing the board to designate areas of emphasis.

During the Annual Meeting we could observe John Legge, the West Michigan director of the Nature Conservancy, foraging through the sandy backdunes and scrub pines of the Presbyterian Camp, a series of coursees and brandwalks built into the sand dimes a century ago. The weather was wet, windy, and wild, and John's solo dune walk netted boranic samples and stories told indoors in front of the fireplace, This writer was grapeful to find the camp's corrages had hear!

Traverse City attorney Jim Olson discussed environmental laws "public trust doctrine," which says government should guard certain resources like water and place public benefit before private commerce. This idea of stewardship has been tested in pres wave.

One area of concern is a loophole in the international 2008 Great Lakes Compact. which prohibits water diversions outside the natural watershed. But, if the water is part of a product inrended for immediate consumer end use, such as paint, for instance, that use is allowed. In another case, a nine-year court battle concluded in July, the Nestle Borrling Company was allowed to sell significant amounts of streamwater ourside of the Great Lakes basin, for the first time in

Michigan law annals. The Nesde plant, which bottles 200,000 gallons of water a minute, tidily illustrates how water itself can be the product for international export.

Another speaker, Melvin Visser, authored Cold, Clear and Deadly. As a chemist with Upjohn for 35 years,

Mel had a first-person view of 20th century view of 20th century contaminants. After his retirement he began a quest to document POPs—persistent origanic pollutants, a ka. the "dirty dozen"—especially in the global jair supply. Though they were banned in the ¿U.S. in 1979, PCB concentrations in the

stoady, Visiting the Arccivec to document the Inuit's dict and global exposure to PCBs, Visser wrote the book as a memoir of his personal quest to preserve Lake Superior. Of his early days as a young practicing scientist, he says, "We just didt' know."
